COLLEGE 101

Your postsecondary options include:

- Trade and technical schools offering certificates and on-the-job training
- The military offering on-the-job and specialized training
- Apprenticeships offering on-the-job training
- Community and Junior colleges offering certificates and 2-year Associate degrees
- Colleges offering 4-year Bachelor's degrees (and sometimes 2-year Associate degrees, too)
- Universities offering 4-year Bachelor's degrees as well as "first professional degrees" (graduate degrees) and PhDs

Choosing a college can be difficult! Keep these college-lifestyle factors in mind:

COST

How much will it cost me to go to this school or college? How much is tuition (the cost of classes and fees)? How much is room and board (the cost of living on campus)?

PROGRAM/MAJOR OPTIONS OFFERED

Do they have a major that will lead to my career choice? Do they offer the type of degree I want (2-year? 4-year? Certificate? On-the-job training?)? Do they offer a variety of choices in case I change my mind later?

CAMPUS ENVIRONMENT

How many students are on campus? Is it big and busy, or small and intimate? Is it located in the city or in the country? Near a beach or in the mountains? Could I be happy there? Could I learn there?

SOCIAL LIFE

What kinds of students will I be interacting with? What types of clubs, activities, and sports can I participate in? What is the vibe on campus?

School Profile: Crest University

COST: \$38,000/year (tuition + room and board)

PROGRAM OPTIONS OFFERED: 4-year Bachelor's degrees in a wide variety of subjects including literature, the arts, the sciences, and business

CAMPUS ENVIRONMENT: 500 miles away in a small, rural town. Campus is green with many parks and trees. Difficult to get around without a car.

SOCIAL LIFE: 4,500 students from different backgrounds. Has a special focus on diversity. Most students participate in clubs or intramural sports.

VALUES ALIGNMENT: Private college, funded in part by members of a religious order. Special financial aid programs for students from low-income backgrounds. Focus on social justice and helping others.



School Profile: Johnson State College

COST: \$17,000/year in-state (tuition + room and board)

PROGRAM OPTIONS OFFERED: 2-year Associates, 4-year Bachelors, Masters, and PhDs in a wide variety of subjects including literature, the arts, the sciences, and business. Also offers technical programs like auto body mechanics and computer technology.

CAMPUS ENVIRONMENT: 2 hours from home in a midsize city. Buses connect the campus to your hometown.

SOCIAL LIFE: 25,000 students including those who live on campus and those who commute. Students are part-time and full-time. Not everyone participates in campus events. Some nontraditional students (parents, working adults, etc.).

VALUES ALIGNMENT: Public university, open to anyone. Family housing program for students who are married or have kids. Very diverse campus with students from all over the world.



School Profile: East County Community College


COST: \$3,000/year (tuition only)

PROGRAM OPTIONS OFFERED: Certificate, 2-year Associates, 4-year Bachelors (IF students transfer to Johnson State College after first 2 years). Programs and majors are mostly technical and hands-on, including computer technology, auto body mechanics, and medical assistant programs.

CAMPUS ENVIRONMENT: 15 minutes from home, accessible via public transportation. Located in a large office building downtown. Limited outdoor space.

SOCIAL LIFE: 7,000 students, all of whom commute. No one lives on campus. Most students have jobs outside of school, so they do not participate in many activities. Students come to learn and then go home.

VALUES ALIGNMENT: Community college, open to anyone. A wide variety of hands-on learning programs. Your work can transfer to either Crest University or Johnson State College.



School Profile: Aim Career and Technical School

COST: \$1,200/year (tuition only)

PROGRAM OPTIONS OFFERED: Certificate, 2-year Associates (in some programs but not all). Programs and majors are only technical and handson, including computer technology, auto body mechanics, and medical assistant programs.

CAMPUS ENVIRONMENT: 15 minutes from home, accessible via public transportation. Located in a large office building downtown. No outdoor space, no cafeteria, no study space, no library.

SOCIAL LIFE: 1,500 students, all of whom commute. No one lives on campus. Most students have jobs outside of school, so they do not participate in many activities. Students come to learn and then go home.

VALUES ALIGNMENT: Career and technical training school, open to anyone. Have many 6-month to 2-year technical & certificate programs. Work does not transfer to any of the other colleges, however. Excellent job placement assistance. Perfect for students who want to be prepared for their career quickly.
