A **career cluster** is a group of careers related by the type of educational background or skills required, the type of work done, or the setting in which the work is completed. Read the descriptions of the career clusters below. Then decide which you think would best fit your interests and why. #### **Agriculture, Food, and Natural Resources**

Producing, processing, marketing, distributing, financing, and developing agricultural commodities and resources, including food, natural resources, and other plant and animal products

#### **Architecture and Construction**

Designing, planning, managing, building, and maintaining the built environment including buildings, parks, roads, bridges, and other structures

#### Arts, Audio-Video Technology, and Communications

Designing, producing, exhibiting, performing, writing, and publishing multimedia content, including visual and performing arts and design, journalism, and entertainment services

#### **Business, Management, and Administration**

Planning, organizing, directing, and evaluating business functions including budgeting, hiring and firing, project planning, and accounting

#### **Education and Training**

Planning, managing, and providing education and training services, and related learning support services

#### Finance

Planning and providing services for financial and investment planning, banking, insurance, and businesses

#### **Government and Public Administration**

Planning and executing governmental laws and initiatives including national security, foreign service, planning, taxation, regulation, and management and administration at the local, state, and federal levels

#### **Health Science**

Planning, managing, and providing therapeutic services, diagnostic services, health informatics, support services, and biotechnology research and development

#### **Hospitality and Tourism**

Managing, marketing, and operating restaurants and other food services, hotels, attractions, recreation events, and travel-related services

#### **Human Services**

Meeting social and individual needs by remediating problems, connecting people to resources and support services, and otherwise assisting people in need.

#### **Information Technology**

Designing, developing, supporting, and managing computer hardware, software, multimedia, websites, and system integration services

#### Law, Public Safety, Corrections, and Security

Planning, managing, and providing legal, public safety, protective, and homeland security services, including professional and technical support services

#### Manufacturing

Planning, managing, and performing the processing of materials into intermediate or final products, including production planning, maintenance, and manufacturing/process engineering

#### Marketing, Sales, and Service

Planning, managing, and performing marketing activities including advertising, sales, public relations, social media, and branding

#### Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics

Planning, managing, and providing scientific research and professional and technical services (such as physical science, social science, engineering), including laboratory and testing services, and research and development services

#### **Transportation, Distribution, and Logistics**

Planning, managing, and moving people, materials, and goods by road, pipeline, air, rail, and water, including transportation infrastructure planning and management, logistics services, mobile equipment, and facility maintenance

## careers in business, management, and administration

Master's Degree (2 years of graduate study at a university)

Chief Executive Officer	\$189,520/year	Designs company policies and provides overall direction to an organization.



### Minimum Education Level Required:

Bachelor's Degree (4 years of undergraduate study at a college or university)

Human Resources Manager	\$130,000/year	Manages payroll, health care, hiring, and firing at a large company.
Public Relationship Manager	\$129,430/year	Plan, direct, or coordinate activities designed to create or maintain a favorable public image for their organization or client
Agent/Manager of Artists or Performers	\$82,730/year	Works with clients to develop strategies for their careers, and to explain actions taken on their behalf.
Accountant	\$78,000/year	Prepares and examines accounting records and financial statements.
Employee Training Specialist	\$63,080/year	Trains and teaches employees of a company how to better do their jobs.

A **career path** is the road you follow toward meeting your ultimate goal of success and self-fulfillment. Career paths are not always straight and narrow. Compare the examples which follow. Most people nowadays don't stay in the same job for their whole lives. Instead, they develop skills through two different types of education — formal and informal. This education opens doors and makes it possible for you to take advantage of opportunities that come your way.

- Formal education takes place at a training program, community college, or university
- Informal education takes place in the world on the job, at an internship, or in the community

Both types of education can be valuable to you as you navigate through a career path. Career paths are not always straight and narrow. Compare the example career paths which follow.

## Jim Johnson, Chef



**AGE:** 27

**CURRENT POSITION:** Sous-Chef

#### JIM'S CAREER PATH

"My mother is an amazing cook. When I was a kid, I'd stand right next to her in the kitchen and watch her work. I started working in restaurants when I was 12 as a bus boy, moving up to dishwasher and later, a line cook. In high school, I got accepted into a vocational program which taught me the basics of how to chop, fry, and sauté. After graduation, I decided to pursue cooking seriously, so I went to the Culinary Institute of America, where I earned my BS in Food Science and Nutrition. I came to St. Louis at 22 and started working at some pretty fancy restaurants. I was a long way from my mother's kitchen back home! I needed to reconnect with food, so I took 6 months off and traveled around Italy and Spain, learning about their cuisine. When I came back, I took a job as sous-chef at Taste, a restaurant that makes my kind of food — simple but perfect. As sous-chef, I am the Executive Chef's #2 man. I do anything and everything to make sure his vision gets on the plate every night, as perfectly as possible."

#### **NEXT STEPS**

"This job is great, but someday soon I'd like to open my own restaurant, where I can be my own boss and create my own menu all by myself. I'd like to name it Lucille, after my mom."

## Traci Lopez, Small Business Owner

#### TRACY'S CAREER PATH

"I've always been into art and crafts, but my parents really wanted me to have a stable career, so, instead of going to art school, I went to the big state university and got a B.A. in history with a minor in economics. After college, I went to work for a company that bought used textbooks and sold them to college students for a profit. I helped them design a plan for a website that ended up being a huge success! I was enjoying my job, but decided to also study for a Master's of Business Administration (an MBA) at night, so I'd have more options later. I worked for a few more years as a VP, but I started to realize that I just wasn't happy with what I was doing. I hadn't done anything creative in years, and I really couldn't have cared less about used textbooks. The only fun part about my day was when I came home at night and worked on a sweater I was knitting. And then I looked around and saw that EVERYONE I knew was knitting! I realized that I could do something creative and make money, so I quit my job and opened a yarn store in my neighborhood. I used what I had learned at my company and through my education to make the store successful. I'm so much happier sitting in my shop and chatting with customers than I had been working at my old company."

#### **NEXT STEPS**

"Luckily I had some money saved from my old job so I could open the store, but even though I get a lot of customers, the store is not profitable yet. This means I haven't made enough money to cover my expenses. Once the store starts to turn a profit, I might consider selling it and going back to corporate life, but I doubt it! If the store is really successful, I might open another location, or I might start an e-business. The future is wide open!"

## Larry Doggerel, Computer Programmer

#### LARRY'S CAREER PATH

"I've always been a big technology nerd. It all started when my parents bought us a Nintendo for Christmas one year. In high school, I was a huge gamer and I started getting into programming by learning simple languages like C++ and html. I spent four years at the University of Michigan studying Computer Science. In my junior year, my friends and I built a really cool program which earned us a prize from Microsoft. After I graduated with my BS in Computer Science, I did an internship at Apple. That internship led to a job with an internet start-up company. I worked there for 5 years, gaining experience and learning about the industry. I left my job at the start-up to join my current company, where I not only write code all day but I also get to manage other programmers and contribute to the company's vision."

#### **NEXT STEPS**

"My job is fun right now, but my dream is to someday start my own company where I can be my own boss and hire the people I want to work with. In a few years, I'd like to come up with a great idea, like Google or Facebook, and build a company around it. Then I can retire when I'm 35 as a millionaire! If that doesn't happen, I'll probably try to move up in my current company and become a Vice President or a CEO someday."

#### DR. LIU'S CAREER PATH

"I went to Skidmore College and majored in biology and Latin American studies. After college, I decided to spend a couple years teaching bilingual students in a highneeds school. After teaching, I realized that I wanted to go to medical school, so I spent a year working part-time as a waitress while studying for the MCAT, which is a special test that potential doctors must take. I got accepted to Brown University and spent four years in medical school there, learning the basics of anatomy, physiology, and what it means to be a doctor. My experience as a teacher taught me that I really loved working with kids, so I decided to specialize in Pediatrics. After medical school, I did my three-year required residency program in New York City at Columbia University Hospital. In my residency I learned the specifics of pediatric medicine and finally started treating patients. After residency, I was hired as a staff pediatrician at a local hospital. I worked there for seven years before I moved into my current position as a director. As a director, not only do I treat sick kids, but I also manage the other pediatricians and nurses on the pediatric floor of the hospital."

#### **NEXT STEPS**

"I really enjoy being a director, so I think I will stay in the position for a few years. If I feel like I enjoy working at a hospital, I might decide to look for a position as a hospital administrator, where I wouldn't see patients anymore but just work to make the hospital run better. But, if I decide I don't like being a manager, I might decide to leave the hospital and start my own private practice, where I can see patients out of an office I run myself. Either way, I hope to keep making a big difference in the lives of the children I treat."

#### KATIE'S CAREER PATH


